Steve also shared a lot of ideas he has picked up about finishes and how to extend the life of them, books on wood, foam brush uses and techniques, and how to set up the wolverine varigrind jig.

## Minutes Tuckessee Woodturners October 5, 2015 Club Meeting

The October club meeting was called to order by President Jon Haigh at 7:00 pm on October 5, 2015 at the FOP Lodge 2576 North Ford Street in Clarksville TN. Gary Elliston and Brent Callis were introduced as visitors. Mike Todd was introduced as a new member. Turn-Ins have started for the year and are held at the FOP Lodge on the fourth Saturday of each month. The next one is scheduled for October 24, 2015.

The club is signed up to participate in the Hand Made Holidays sale to be held on November 14th & 15th at the Wilma Rudolph Events Center at the Marina. A signup sheet was circulated for those who wish to sell at the club booth. Brochures advertising the 2016 Tennessee Association of Woodturners Symposium were circulated. The symposium will be held on January 29 & 30, 2016 at the Franklin Marriott Cool Springs. President Jon advised he has purchased a new video camera for the club but he needs to get the proper cables to plug it into the television at the FOP Lodge. He anticipates having it operational for the November meeting.

There was no report on the last month sales or the bank balance.

President Jon reminded us that we have been asked to provide a window display for the month of March 2016 by the Downtown Artist Cooperative. Items to be displayed will need to be brought to the February club meeting along with signage describing the items.

President Jon asked if the club wanted to give away a free registration to the TAW Symposium to be held in January. We did this last year. Jim Mason made a motion that we give a free registration which was seconded and approved by those present. The drawing will be held at the December meeting. To be eligible, members must be present at the meeting and must have paid their 2016 club dues.

Jim Mason showed a Jet mini lathe he had for sale at \$375.00. If interested, see Jim. Mike Todd said he has a lathe he will give away to a good home. If interested, contact Mike.

Jon Holloway announced he has a Craftsman table sale. It is approximately 20 years old. Jon wants \$50.00 for it. If interested, contact Jon.

Each meeting, members bring in projects they have been working on and show them during "Show & Tell". Items displayed this month included:

Steve Sabinash presented the program showing how he turns large bowls and sharing some of the ways he does things when turning. Steve demonstrated using two pieces of wood. One was spalted maple and the second was hackberry. During the demonstration he discovered a defect in the hackberry when the tenon broke. Fortunately only the bowl was hurt!

Among the tips he shared with use were:

- He uses Novus Plastic Clean & Shine to clean and remove scratches from his face shield.
- Steve showed us a book, "The Woodbook – The Complete Plates" by Taschen which is available from Amazon for about \$25.00. It contains over 700 pages with pictures and descriptions of different wood types.
- To prolong the life of open containers of CA glue, Steve stores them in Mason jars along with a desiccant pack.
- The CA glue he uses is "Star Bond" and is available in various consistencies as well as a couple of colors.

- 5. Steve also stores Helmsman MinWax in small jars to reduce the amount of air the product is exposed to and extend its useful life.
- The foam brushes he uses when applying finish are Poly-Brush made by Jen Manufacturing.
- Steve passed out sheets showing how he sets up his Oneway Wolverine Vari-grind Attachment to sharpen his tools. The setup sheet can be downloaded from

www.thompsonlathetools.com and

- 8. and clicking on the "Sharpening" tab.

- 11.clicking on the "Sharpening" tab.
  Once setup, he uses blocks of wood to set the extension for the bracket to get repeatable grinds each time. A block 4 ¾" long yields a 60 degree angle and shortening the block by 3/8" reduces the angle by 5 degrees.

- 12.By having four blocks, he can quickly setup for four different grind angles.
- 13. When sharpening, Steve marks the bevel edge of the tool with a black magic marker. This makes it easy for him to see where he is grinding. This reduces the amount of metal he removes when grinding and extend tool life.
- 14.Steve uses a Spear Point Scraper for tenons and work on small pieces. He also uses a Detail Spindle Gouge for fine work.
- 15. When power sanding slow the lathe speed down when using grits above 120. Also, when changing sand paper grit, the next grit should be no higher than twice the grit number of the previous paper being used. For example when moving up for 80 grit, don't go to a grit finer than 160 grit.
- 16.Steve likes to use Mahoney Walnut Oil when finishing.
