## Charles Putnam Keeps Us Informed.....

Since we have a number of new people involved in the club I thought an information article might be helpful in the Tuckessee Woodturners Newsletter.

The Tuckessee Woodturners Club was established ten years ago this coming October to promote the craft of woodturning in general. During those years we have taught many classes both formal and informal at a variety of locations. Education has always been one of our primary goals.

Members can be counted on....

The club has always had members with varied levels of interest ranging from a basic hobby to becoming artists in their own right. Our success is due to the contribution of many members in a variety of ways: from making spinning tops to cash donations. Example: A little over a year ago the club decided it needed a larger lathe for demonstrating and teaching. Over that year or so we collected \$2,500.00 to buy a lathe and accessories. Quite remarkable for a club with around forty members. Listed below is information about specific club activities you may want to participate in.

Downtown Farmers Market.....

This Market is held every Saturday in downtown, on the square from the 19<sup>th</sup> of May to the middle of October. The Market opens at 9:00 AM and closes

at 1:00 PM. We usually have two tents: One to sell from and one to demonstrate from. Our demonstrators attract a lot of visitors who may become buyers and/or members.

Any club member may sell their woodturning items there at no charge of any kind. No matter if you have one item or hundreds. It is a fun event just to be there meeting new people and making new friends. We always need help there even though you might not be selling. The club pays all the expenses for our participation so there are no individual charges. We participate in the Market the 1<sup>st</sup> Saturday of each month.

We are Chartered through AAW...

Our club is Chartered by the American Association of Woodturners (AAW), but there is no requirement for individual members to join the AAW. Individual membership has many advantages ranging from liability insurance while in a club activity to a great woodturning magazine each quarter. Membership in AAW is in the area of \$45 per year. In order to turn as a demonstrator at any of our public events, we require you to have liability insurance. This insurance comes with membership in AAW.

Membership in our club is easy and affordable...

Dues in our club, the Tuckessee Woodturners, are \$15 a year for individuals and \$20 a year for a family membership. You will certainly get your money's worth for these dues in a years time.

Training Program....

Our training program consists of two major aspects. The first is at our Saturday morning Turn-Ins. These are held each month on the fourth Saturday, September through May. We close the Turn-Ins down during the summer months. There is no charge for anyone to join these sessions and we supply everything...from lathes to tools and wood.

The second aspect of our available training is where you are invited into a member's shop to learn directly from him or her. Our members are scattered around the Clarksville area, so we can usually find one near you.
