The Editor and Jack Bastin Visit Mike Patrick's shop.



The lathe in this picture is the first good lathe Mike bought. It has a home made stand made from 4" timbers. The white circle in the foreground is a

beall buffing wheel mounted on the lathe bench with a 1/2 hp motor. He says storage is always a problem for a pack rat and a tool nut like him. He thought a peg board would be good to have things in the open where he could see them. He said this was good, to a point, but each item collects dust. And, that it would be much better to have cabinets with doors to store stuff in to make clean up more efficient.

The lathe in this picture is a Powermatic 3520b. He says he loves it. Just behind is his lathe tool sharpening station with a wolverine jig. On the right side of the picture is where he keeps the turning tools he uses most often. And one with a hole drilled to hold each tool. And he has magnet strips attached to hold small tools and measuring instruments



The (14'X21') room pictured here is inside a 36'X52' metal building. The room is insulated and decked above so it can be used for storage. Mike

said the person (himself) who works or plays in this shop is very messy and has a bad habit of not putting away his tools when he is done, or cleaning up his mess in a timely manner.



His filing cabinet is a good place to store manuals and magazines, etc. The lathe in this picture is a small Nova...good for turning smaller things.



This is a close up of his sharpening station. Note the color of the wheels...they are what is recommended for HHS lathe tools. He said the slow speed (1725 rpm) grinder is old. I can tell you it still works. On the left side of the picture is a compressor water trap and regulator. A compressor is very handy in a shop and especially for wood turning.



Here is his 18" band saw inside the big shop area. It is on a mobile base, and set to the side. He tries to keep an area open where he can pull a vehicle in to work on it or change oil.



Mike said he never throws much away because you can never have enough wood or bolts you might need later.

We enjoyed our tour through Mike's shop. It is so well equipped that I know you like me are envious. And there is more of what Mike calls stuff (junk) than what is pictured. He lives in the country, so he said if he wants to he can be more messy. He added that wood shavings make good mulch. Mike has always been eager to assist with ideas and technical know how with fellow turners.

More Than One Way To Mount... By Jim Mason

Most beginners mount work with a face plate. This is good, but makes it difficult to adjust the piece to the best features in the wood and it is difficult sometimes to get a flat surface to fasten to. There are other was that may work better.

Try mounting between centers and make a tennon on the tailstock end to fit your 4 jaw chuck. Or, while it is mounted between centers, flatten the tailstock end so that you will have a flat surface to fasten your faceplate.

Try using a screw center that fits into the morse taper in your headstock. Or, if you have a 4 jaw chuck, you probably have a 3/8 in screw that you can use in the chuck. Clarence Duzan uses this method to turn large platters.

A glue block is a good way to work with small blocks. Glue a scrap piece of wood to the headstock end of your work. This is famous woodturner, Paul Ferrell's favorite way of mounting.

Practice, practice, practice, and get some help, is the way to learn.
